PhD studentships

With many funders moving to consolidated, institutional block grants, many people seem to think our internal allocation is one of the only (or at least the easiest) ways to actually get new PhD students. Bad news first – it's not!

In a large College with very few students, it's actually pretty tough. But wait – good news! There are still loads of external opportunities that people seem to have missed. From the standalone [BHF studentships](#), [Wellcome Trust Doctoral Studentships in Medical Humanities](#) to the [MRC](#) and [BBSRC CASE studentships](#) (which have had funding rates of nearly 50% recently), there are plenty of chances to get students externally funded.

Check out the specific opportunities link through this newsletter, and rest assured we'll give you plenty of help with the applications.

Internal funding streams

For those of you in need of funding to help with career development and pilot data for future grants, the College's **Research Development Fund** is particularly aimed at early- and mid-career researchers.

It can provide up to £5,000 for small research projects, travel to learn new skills and develop collaborations, or to help generate that extra bit of data for high-impact publications. It's a simple 2-page application with decisions made by a cross-College committee. The next deadline is 12pm Monday 7th October. We also anticipate another round of Wellcome Trust ISSF calls later this year, which is very similar to the above but allows for projects up to around £20,000. We'll update you all as soon as we hear more...

Fellowships

Thinking about the next step in your career? There are a bewildering number of fellowship opportunities available (see the link in this newsletter), from the range of [NIHR Fellowships](#) (expected to open October with a deadline in January) to the [MRC](#)'s portfolio of Career Development Awards, Clinician Scientists, Population Health or Methodology Fellowships through to Senior Fellowships. And the [Wellcome Trust](#) funding is pretty much all about fellows, from basic and clinical schemes to their huge Investigator Awards (which actually get less applications than you would think – now's a good time to go for them!).

Whatever you're interested in, and however far in the future, come and talk to your local Research Facilitator and get support for early academic input via the Grant Clinics or mentoring schemes we run, and look out for our R&KT Workshop in October specifically about Fellowships and how to get yourself ready for them.

RCUK Impact

Confused about what on earth MRC, BBSRC or any of the other Research Councils mean by 'Impact Summary' vs 'Pathways to Impact'? Fear not – your Research Facilitator can help you tackle these, which are becoming an increasingly important part of the review process to help decide between a range of strong science proposals.

- Your **Summary** should explain who can benefit and how, such as industry, clinicians, patients, the public, or other academic groups.
- Your **Pathways** have to explain how you will specifically reach out to these groups within the lifetime of your grant.

We can work with you to make sure you're making the most of the local infrastructure to support these activities, and don't forget that the Research Councils actually expect you to cost in funding specifically to help you achieve this – up to 5% of the total cost of your grant...

Pink forms – when should I submit?

The '[pink form](#)' is the College approval that lets you go ahead and submit a grant. It is needed for every grant, from those you are the lead researcher on to ones on which you're a collaborator with other institutions, and for preliminary outline grants as well as full and final submissions.

However, the aim is really to provide you with support and feedback early, so don't wait for a final draft of the proposal or every last penny on your finances – go ahead and fill it in as soon as you have a good draft, aim for two weeks before submission.

Internships and Secondments

Want to get more out of your PhD, or work with bright minds outside of the academic sector? There are a range of opportunities open to help you do just that.

From the Academy of Medical Science 3-month '[Policy Internships](#)' open to all MRC funded PhD students, to the [Knowledge Transfer Secondment scheme](#) operated by the University (deadlines 4 times per year), working with people outside of your discipline can open up new opportunities for funding and career development that might not typically come your way. Speak to your Research Facilitator to find out more about how to apply.

Public engagement support

Anyone enthusiastic about interacting with the public can apply for small internal grants anywhere up to £1,500 (and possibly more if discussed early) to develop novel, imaginative engagement activities and tools through the University's Public Engagement Working Group, chaired by Alice Roberts and supported locally by Eliot Marston (e.d.marston@bham.ac.uk).

We're also keen to help you develop ideas about potential audiences to interact with and how to create your own activities, whether for your Pathways to Impact statements or just because you'd like to get involved, so check out our [intranet support](#) (and tell us how we can improve it!).

If you are keen on interacting with patients and the public to help with NIHR grant funding – an increasing priority now that public representatives sit on the panel making funding decisions – then the local [Research Design Service](#) offer bursaries of up to £500 as well as advice on how best to deliver activity.

It's good to talk
