This will provide students made an offer through Adjustment or Clearing the opportunity to visit the University and tour accommodation. Please note that all students coming through Adjustment or Clearing are guaranteed a place in accommodation.

- Do you have Year 12 and 13 students who are unsure about going to university?

- Would you like your students to see what a university is like on a normal working day?

If you've answered yes to any of the above questions, then you should consider bringing your students to one of our Sixth Form Study Afternoons or Sixth Form Study Days.

## What will students gain from a Sixth Form Study Afternoon or Study Day?

Students will experience university-style lectures and workshops delivered by engaging and passionate academic members of staff, meet current students and admissions tutors and enjoy a campus tour. In addition, they will extend their knowledge and understanding in that particular subject.

### When do Sixth Form Study Afternoons and Sixth Form Study Days take place?

The College of Arts and Law run an autumn programme in November and December and a spring programme in February and March, usually on Wednesdays and Fridays.

### How can I make sure that a Sixth Form Study Afternoon or Sixth Form Study Day is useful and relevant to my students?

Each year, we survey heads of department in the relevant subjects in schools and sixth form colleges. This way, we can tailor the afternoons and days to the most popular texts, themes, topics and ideas.

For example, many of the English and Drama teachers from the schools who attended last year told us in advance that they were studying Shakespeare's 'King Lear' which led us to create a bespoke Sixth Form Study Afternoon, with four focused lectures on different aspects of the play, including a lecture that involved actors from The Shakespeare Institute performing a key scene. This supplemented what students had already studied in class, gave them ideas for their assessments and generally enthused students afresh.

A teacher on the 'King Lear' Study Afternoon commented: 'All tasks were valuable as they took aspects of the play which were not the most obvious and therefore presented new issues to think about. The breadth of ideas sparked off new ways of looking at the text.'
