## Birmingham-Jinan MBA programme launches

The University of Birmingham (UK) and Jinan University (China) have joined forces to nurture management talent in and around South China as they launch the latest version of the Birmingham MBA.

The Birmingham-Jinan MBA is a part-time executive programme run by Birmingham Business School, University of Birmingham and the School of Management, Jinan University, Guangzhou.



The programme aims to foster high-level management talent in South China and the neighbouring region, allowing students to be better able to meet the demands of Chinese economic and social development, as well as the internationalisation needs of local enterprises. It also focuses on the development of leadership skills, which include innovative thinking linked to professional knowledge providing students and managers with vital skills that will give them a long-term return on their studies, enabling them to confront the key challenges facing their organisation in a constantly changing business environment.

The programme is taught in English jointly by faculty from Birmingham Business School, who travel to Guangzhou to deliver modules and Jinan School of Management, who will be teaching a number of elective modules. The latest research ideas are incorporated into the programme to ensure relevant and up-to-date learning. On successful completion of the course, students will be awarded an MBA degree from the University of Birmingham and a certificate of completion from Jinan University.

The programme is led by Professor Derek Condon, Director of Postgraduate Taught Programmes, Birmingham Business School. Professor Condon taught the first module – International Business – with students from a variety of backgrounds and nationalities. He said:

“The launch of the Birmingham-Jinan programme establishes a competitive MBA program for senior managers of Chinese and international companies in South China. It does this by integrating resources from both Birmingham Business School and the Jinan School of Management, institutions that both enjoy a long history and strong reputation.

“With four intakes per year, we expect the programme to become very popular with both local and international students, who want to be based in South China while experiencing and benefiting from a UK, Russell Group, qualification.”

One of the first students to enrol on the Birmingham MBA in China is Zach Wortham, Director of Manufacturing Operations at Skullcandy, an American lifestyle audio brand. Zach has been living and working in South China for eight years and oversees an office of 50 staff. Commenting on the Birmingham MBA, Zach said

“The University of Birmingham and Jinan MBA programme represents a unique and special opportunity to learn from some of the world’s most experienced business minds, while based in the heart of the industrial workhorse that is South China. Add to that the high quality of the support staff and impressive calibre of the students who are signing up and you can see why it was an easy decision to choose the Birmingham MBA programme.”

The opening ceremony on Thursday 11 September was attended by Professor Derek Condon, Director of Postgraduate Programmes, Birmingham Business School; Professor Di Deng, Assistant Dean, Director of MBA Programmes, School of Management, Jinan University; Peter Clack, Director International Relations at University of Birmingham; and Vivian Yingyi Zheng, China Director of Operations, University of Birmingham Guangzhou Centre.

The Birmingham MBA’s latest incarnation in Guangzhou follows 21 years of successful delivery in Singapore. The programme has also been running in Hong Kong since 2002 and is delivered as part of a collaborative provision arrangement with the Open University, Hong Kong (OUHK).

## Global China: New Approaches Lecture Series

Chinese "Illegalities" in Colonial Southeast Asia: Lessons from the Fin-de-Siècle Maritime World,

a lecture by Eric Tagliacozzo from Cornell University.

How have Chinese been typecast as "illegal" in colonial eyes in the various parts of Southeast Asia? What has been their significance as a community, and how has this changed over time? To what extent is Chinese "illegality" a myth and to what extent has it corresponded to any historical truth? My presentation will examine the interface between overseas Chinese and the colonial state writ-large in Maritime Southeast Asia, particularly in the Dutch East Indies and British Malaya, over the course of the late nineteenth and the early twentieth centuries. In the first part of my talk, I will look at various sites of contestation, as this pertained to this ethnic divide across the Insular World of Southeast Asia. The second part of my talk looks at the archipelago through "secret societies" and "illegal trade", as these concepts were understood by colonial governments. Finally, the third part of the lecture then focuses on the border itself, partially maritime in nature and partially overland, as Chinese communities on the evolving frontier were classified by these states. In total, I hope to show some of the ways in which the maritime Southeast Asian milieu dictated new ways of type-casting Chinese communities, and how this fit into larger taxonomic processes of the state at a time of evolving modernity.

**Speaker Biography:** Eric Tagliacozzo, Director of the Comparative Muslim Societies Program, Director of the Cornell Modern Indonesia Project and Professor of History at Cornell University. Author of *Secret Trades, Porous Borders: Smuggling and States Along a Southeast Asian Frontier, 1865-1915* (2005); *The Longest Journey: Southeast Asians and the Pilgrimage to Mecca* (2013).

## From Lancashire to China: a Weaver's Tale - Tuesday 1st July - Thursday 16th October 2014

Follow the story of Lucy Mellodey (1870-1930), a cotton weaver from Blackburn in Lancashire who swapped mill work for nearly 30 years in the interior of China as a missionary. When she set sail for the first time in 1899, Lucy embarked on a life of travel and experiences which few working class women of the time had opportunity to pursue. The exhibition tells her story through original documents, photographs and artefacts.

## Global impact in Engineering and Physical Sciences: Leading the way in computer science and electrical engineering- July

Information science research is transforming the future landscape of our world at a rapid pace. Thanks to technology being developed by the University in collaboration with Chinese scientists, Birmingham is leading the way, from tracking consumer behaviour and pioneering smartphone capability to mapping underground energy systems and healthcare technology. The University of Birmingham has partnered the University of Science and Technology China (USTC), the country's leading institution for science and technology, for more than a decade and has seen growing scholarly exchange and knowledge transfer.

Building on the success of a dedicated research laboratory for Nature Inspired Computation and Its Applications, set up in 2003, the institutions established a formal research institute, The USTC-Birmingham Joint Research Institute in Intelligent Computation and Its Applications, in 2010. Professor Xin Yao, Professor of Computer Science and Director of the joint USTC-Birmingham Research Institute, and Professor Ian McLoughlin, Professor in Electronic Engineering and Information Science at USTC and Birmingham alumnus, have embraced travel in their research endeavours and understand first-hand the significance of international collaboration.

Professor Xin Yao, who received his PhD from USTC, leads the USTC-Birmingham Joint Research Institute in Intelligent Computation and Its Applications.

*'The Research Institute focuses on two main areas: adaptive optimisation and advanced data analysis and mining.'*

By working closely with engineers and technicians, the Institute develops applied operations research using nature-inspired approaches. Such cross-disciplinary approaches provide solutions to everyday concerns such as vehicle routing challenges. The Institute's other focus, data analysis and mining, is an important challenge of the digital age. The research is of significant commercial value with internet companies competing to understand consumer behaviours. Xin's team is able to analyse data collected from users to map trends and are engaged with Baidu (China's Google) to take this information one step further and consider predictions connected to browser pathways.

Professor Ian McLoughlin's 22-year career, including work across three continents for multinationals, big and small industries, charities, consultancies and academia, began at the University's School of Electronic, Electrical and Computer Engineering, where he received his undergraduate degree. He returned to the University for his PhD. He joined USTC as Professor in the Department of Electronic Engineering and Information Science in 2012.

*'Working in China was a long-term ambition for me and I was delighted to make the move two years ago. USTC seems to have recently begun a significant drive to increase the number of international professors working in the University, and the number of international students studying there. This coincided with the setting up of a National Engineering Laboratory relating to speech – which is my main research area.'*

Ian's research in speech processing looks at the conversion of whispers to speech aided by computer technology.

*'This research has extremely important applications: for some classes of patients who have lost their voice, perhaps due to disease, or as a result of a surgical procedure, the technology can be life-changing.'*

Ian's projects have commercial value. While whisper conversion was initially envisaged as a technique applicable to voice loss, it is becoming more viable as a technology for mainstream users who wish to talk to (and whisper to) their intelligent devices. Ian is working with international mobile phone manufacturers.

*'International collaboration is a win-win situation for the institutions and researchers. It can play to the strengths of both teams, avoiding local weaknesses and leveraging on special talents present in both teams.'*

The collaboration enables Xin to map research focuses and demands onto expertise among colleagues in both Birmingham and USTC to ensure a critical mass that can pioneer developments. He said:

*'There is a good match between expertise at Birmingham and USTC and the Institute brings together a range of skills and approaches as well as local and international knowledge. Ian added: 'International collaboration is a win-win situation for the institutions and researchers. It can play to the strengths of both teams, avoiding local weaknesses and leveraging on special talents present in both teams.'*

## University hosts Chinese champions of the Formula Student competition - July



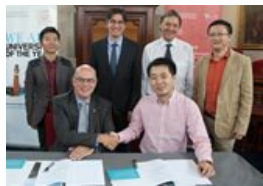

## Prominent Chinese genomics institute announces world-leading research centre with the University of Birmingham - July



BGI, the world's largest genome research institute, has signed a ground-breaking agreement with the University of Birmingham that will create the Joint Centre for Environmental Omics (JCEO) between the two institutions. The JCEO will seek to protect environment, health and global biodiversity by analysing the toxicity of compounds more efficiently than has been achieved before.

Located on the University's Edgbaston campus, the JCEO will specialise in automated ultra-high-throughput sample processing in a facility jointly operated with the BGI China National GeneBank (CNGB). The Centre's work will provide comprehensive and timely data on the effects of thousands of high priority chemicals, advanced materials and their mixtures on biological systems.

BGI, based in Shenzhen, has more than 5,000 employees including over more than 1,000 bioinformatics specialists who are working on solving the globe's most pressing research questions and societal challenges.

Over 60,000 synthetic compounds are used by industry and found in domestic products across the world, for which there is a paucity of information on their potential environmental and health effects. The knowledge gap can be addressed by applying the rapid technological improvements in DNA sequencing and computing power that are transforming the possibilities for regulatory toxicology. These scientific advancements will be crucial to the work of the JCEO, which aims to reduce the uncertainty about compound health risks and help industry fulfil the requirements of European legislation such as REACH and the Water Framework Directive.

John Colbourne, Professor of Environmental Genomics, University of Birmingham and Co-Director, JCEO, said: "Together, REACH and the Water Framework Directive can positively transform environment and human health protection, as long as science can provide robust and cost-effective toxicity tests to be used by industry, policy makers and regulators".

Xin Zhou, Deputy Director, CNGB and Co-Director, JCEO added: "In collaboration with industry and government scientists, the JCEO will allow the European Union and beyond to 'industrialise' knowledge for advancing regulatory science and its applications that will, in turn, lead to a unique mass-scale predictive, quick and relatively inexpensive diagnoses of environmental health concerns".

BGI will staff the JCEO with laboratory technicians and bioinformaticians, who will collaborate with scientists at the University of Birmingham and international partners on a variety of projects.

Dr Yong Zhang, Assistant President, BGI said: "Considering the scale of current environmental health problems, and realistic future projections, we are calling-out to researchers all over Europe and the UK to collaborate with the JCEO in response to international research challenges, so as to maximize the growth of this shared knowledge".

The signing took place between Professor Sir David Eastwood, Vice-Chancellor, University of Birmingham and Dr Yong Zhang, Assistant President, BGI in front of a gathered audience in the University's Senate Chamber on Thursday 3 July.

## Birmingham renews China PhD scholarship scheme with China Scholarship Council - June

The three-day UK visit by the Chinese Premier, Li Keqiang was marked at the University of Birmingham on Monday 16 June 2014 with a renewal of its China doctoral scholarship scheme, run in conjunction with the China Scholarship Council (CSC).



The University of Birmingham has hosted Li Siguang Scholars since 2011, with 18 students currently undertaking PhDs in subjects as diverse as Biology, Mechanical Engineering and Public Administration. The scheme is open to all fields and named in honour of Li Siguang, one of Birmingham's most famous Chinese graduates. The University is currently offering four PhD scholarships for students for 2014 entry, which are awarded, on a competitive basis, for three years of study and include tuition fees and living costs.



CSC is the Chinese Ministry of Education's non-profit organisation that provides student financial aid to Chinese citizens and foreigners to study abroad or to study in China respectively. The renewal of the Memorandum of Understanding between the two institutions was signed by Dr Liu Jinghui, Secretary-General at CSC and Professor Malcolm Press, Pro Vice Chancellor for Research and Knowledge Transfer at the University of Birmingham. Also present was Li Hong, Director of European Affairs at the China Scholarship Council.

In addition to the scholarship, the University has also announced the Li Siguang Publication Prize in the scientist's honour. The annual award is given to the best jointly published paper between the University of Birmingham and Chinese collaborative partners and aims to encourage deeper and wider collaborations with China.

Li Siguang is one of the best-known scientists in China, with a record of important discoveries as an academic. In geological circles, J S Lee (as he was known in publications) was one of the scholars whose work inspired the theory of plate dynamics and a fuller understanding of how the continents and oceans move around the planet.

In terms of his contribution to his country, he was behind the discovery of much of China's oil and gas reserves. He was a pioneer in predicting earthquakes, a trailblazer in establishing the geological history of China and an acute discoverer of new resources.

Born in Huanggang, Hubei Province in 1889 Li Siguang arrived in Birmingham in 1914 to study in the University of Birmingham's School of Mining. Li Siguang received his BSc in 1917 and his MSc in 1918. Having then spent several years researching geology in China, Li Siguang returned to the University of Birmingham for his doctorate, which was awarded in 1931. Subsequently his daughter studied for an MSc in Metallurgy Physics, graduating in 1948.

Li Siguang went on to become Professor at Peking University. He then progressed to become an academician, a lifetime highest honour for Chinese scholars, and Vice-President of the Chinese Academy of Sciences, along with other prestigious positions such as Minister for Geology and President of the Chinese Society for Science and Technology. He died in 1971, but his achievements are still being recognised today, with the Chinese Academy of Sciences acknowledging its debt to his work by arranging in 2009 for a minor planet to be named Li Siguang in his honour.

## Economic success and financial inadequacy: The Chinese puzzle

**An inaugural lecture by Professor Alessandra Guariglia**

Professor Guariglia will discuss how China has been growing at phenomenal rates over the last two decades. Yet, its financial system is relatively underdeveloped. This constitutes a puzzle: looking at countries world-wide, it is observed that those with the fastest growth rates are also those with the best functioning financial systems. Professor Guariglia will propose a number of explanations to this puzzle, ranging from firms' ability to generate large profits that they can re-invest facilitating growth, to their tendency to team up with foreign firms in order to indirectly acquire external equity.

Alessandra Guariglia received her PhD from Boston University. She is currently a Professor of Financial Economics and Head of the Departments of Economics at the University of Birmingham. Prior to that, she has worked at the Universities of Essex, Kent, Nottingham, and Durham. She is an Associate Editor of the Journal of Banking and Finance and the European Journal of Finance. Her research interests are in the areas of financial economics and macroeconomics. Specifically, the focus of her research is on the links between macroeconomic activity and finance and on the economics of transition in China. She has published a range of papers including articles in the Journal of Development Economics; Journal of International Economics; Journal of Banking and Finance; Journal of Comparative Economics; Entrepreneurship Theory and Practice; Economics Letters; Economica; Oxford Economic Papers; Oxford Bulletin of Economics and Statistics; and Econometrics Journal.

Robert Bickers, professor of history at Bristol and director of the British Inter-University China Centre will be delivering a guest lecture at the University of Birmingham on Wednesday 2nd October.

Professor Bickers specialises in modern China, and the history of colonialism, and in particular of the British empire and its relations with China and the history of Shanghai (1843-1950s). Work in this field includes the books Britain in China (1999), and Empire Made Me: An Englishman adrift in Shanghai (2003), and The Scramble for China: Foreign Devils in the Qing Empire, 1832-1914 (2011). His interest in the world of British colonialism more broadly underpins the new volume in the Oxford History of the British Empire companion series that he has edited on British communities across the worlds of formal and informal empire. He is also interested in cemeteries and photographs and their post-colonial lives, clipper ships, lighthouses and meteorology in China.

He is Director of the British Inter-university China Centre, has been a Co-Director of the AHRC-funded REACT Knowledge Exchange Hub, and led an ESRC-funded project, 'Colonialism in comparative perspective: Tianjin under nine flags' (2008-11). He directs the 'Visualising China' initiative, and its underlying Historical Photographs of China digitisation programme. He also formerly ran an AHRC-funded project on the history of the Chinese Maritime Customs Service.

## Generation UK scholarships Workshop – 30th October 2013

The Generation UK campaign aims to see at least 15,000 UK students going to China between 2013 and 2016, supported by the British Council and the Department for Business, Innovation and Skills (BIS). The campaign supports the UK Government's agenda by promoting outward student mobility to foster the competitiveness of the UK and to develop a new generation of globally mobile, culturally agile young people who can succeed and compete in an increasingly borderless marketplace. Generation UK also offers funded internship placements and scholarships for academic study for UK students to gain international experience in China, supported by the Department for Education and Learning, Northern Ireland. This year three Birmingham students have been awarded Generation UK scholarships to study in China from September 2013. ## Guest Lecture – Hepatitis Research in China, 19th September 2013

Hepatitis B and C viruses are a major global health problem resulting in progressive liver disease, including cirrhosis and hepatocellular carcinoma (HCC). HCC is the most common liver malignancy, with an estimated 750,000 new cases and 695,000 deaths per year, rating third in incidence and mortality in the world. Whilst incidence and mortality for other common cancers are declining, this tumour represents an increasing significant public health problem. Despite advances in HCC treatment, most patients die within one year of diagnosis, largely due to recurrence and metastases. In China, there is big population of Hepatitis B and C patients (HPB&HPC). Professor Huang and Professor Peng are experts in the anti-viral research and will talk about their on-going advanced finding in these fields and potential collaboration with our excellent liver research group in our university. All the PIs, senior researcher, post-docs and PhD students from virology research areas will benefit from this seminar and could identify common research interest.

## 2013 UK-China Strategic Workshop on Smart Grids at Birmingham - 18th July

### Shaping the New Energy Industrial Revolution

Leading figures across industry, science and government gathered in the 2013 UK-China strategic workshop on smart grids at the University of Birmingham between 17th and 18th July to further UK-China partnerships in sustainable energy and smart grid technologies.

The workshop was organised by the University of Birmingham, UK Energy Research Centre (UKERC) and the Chinese Society for Electrical Engineering, and sponsored by the University of Birmingham China Institute and UK Energy Research Centre. The workshop builds upon the success of the 2010 meeting which led to three significant joint UK Engineering and Physical Sciences Research Council (EPSRC) and National Natural Science Foundation of China (NSFC) research calls.

Smart grids have emerged as an important platform for China to realise its demanding energy targets, and research and development in this area is a national priority. China's 12th five-year plan expresses its aim to invest \$45 billion dollars in smart grids over five years as part of the wider \$250 billion dollar investment in its power grid. The University of Birmingham has established strong research links with Chinese partners for developments between the UK and China in driving the low carbon transition. The VC of the University, Professor David Eastwood gave the opening speech. He pointed out: "with the rapid global growth in demand for energy, the global cooperation in low-carbon economy is facing unprecedented opportunities to deal with the challenges." He said: "the Workshop held at the University of Birmingham is very timely to lay a good foundation for long-term cooperation between the UK and China in developing sustainable energy and smart grid construction."

The workshop co-chairs are Professor Richard Williams, Pro-Vice-Chancellor and Head of the College of Engineering and Physical Sciences at the University of Birmingham, and Mr Feng Chen, Vice President of State Grid Corporation of China and Executive Vice President of Chinese Society for Electrical Engineering. The Workshop co-chair Professor Richard Williams, Pro-Vice-Chancellor and Head of the College of Engineering and Physical Sciences at the University of Birmingham, he said: "As global demand for power continues to soar, the need for international collaboration to pave the way for the low carbon economy has never been greater. Research expertise at Birmingham complements China's robust commitment to developing its smart grid capacity. This influential workshop will, unquestionably, deliver meaningful UK-China partnerships in sustainable energy and smart grids to address the energy challenges of the future, and we are proud to play a leading role."

The workshop covers topics from smart grids, wind energy generation and energy storage to energy markets and smart information systems, etc. Speakers include Honorary President of State Grid China Electric Power Research Institute (China EPRI, SGCC) Professor Xiao-Xin Zhou and Honorary President of State Grid Electric Power Research Institute (SGEPRI, SGCC) Professor Yusheng Xue, Chair of the Science and Technology Facilities Council (STFC) Professor Sir Michael Sterling, and Executive Director of UKERC Professor John Loughhead, as well as senior figures from Alstom, E.ON UK, Chiltern Power and the National Grid.

## Visit from Sun Yat-sen University, the First Affiliated hospital –15 March

Between 11th and 13th March, our college successfully welcomed a delegation from the first Affiliate hospital, which is attached to Sun Yat-Sen University (SYSU) in China. The visit was led by the President, Professor Shenming Wang - and other three Vice-Presidents of the organisation too. Following the preliminary relations established in our first reciprocal visit with SYSU, Eric Jenkinson (Head of College), Professors Jon Frampton (College Director of R&KT), and Pamela Kearns (Director of the Birmingham CRCTU) hosted the deputation this time.

The itinerary included in-depth and detailed discussions with our leading researchers, to establish a joint Clinical Trials Unit (CTU) located in Guangzhou, and progress other mutual collaborations in the field of translational research. Staff working in all our CTUs (CRCTU, BCTU and PCCTU) presented their work and demonstrated our resources and extensive expertise to counterparts. The delegates were very impressed by our enormous experience and achievements in clinical trials. A provisional agreement has been reached to develop a joint CTU in the largest hospital of Guangzhou, and we hope this Unit will constitute a platform for more potential research collaborations with the University of Birmingham in the future. Accordingly we are currently forming a College working group for the strategic management of the partnership, and to ensure the delivery of real benefits to all participants.

## Chinese Buddhism and Intercultural Studies Symposium – 24 April 2013

Co-hosted by the Department of Theology and Religion and the China Institute in the University of Birmingham, the "Chinese Buddhism and Intercultural Studies Symposium" aims to establish dialogues between those who concern intercultural issues or textual studies related to Chinese religions. The discussion will be opened by Dr Kuan Guang from the Department of the Study of Religions, SOAS, University of London. Guang's principle research interests lie in the field of history of Chinese Buddhism. In his earlier publication, he has reconstructed the history about the life of Sahajasarī, an Indian Buddhist missionary in Ming Dynasty whose influences are often overlooked. At the symposium, Guang will share his viewpoints on the necessity, difficulty and other issues involved in the translations of Chinese Buddhist texts, especially those belong to Wutai Shan Buddhism. In addition to the methodological concerns, he will also try to explain how this particular Buddhist sect may have shaped the practices of some Buddhist traditions in East Asia.

**Bio of Guest Speaker - Professor Shijie Cheng (程时杰院士)** Shijie Cheng, IEEE Fellow, Fellow of Chinese Academy of Sciences, Professor in Huazhong University of Science and Technology, China. He received B.Eng. degree from Xi'an Jiaotong University in 1967, M.Eng. degree from Huazhong University of Science and Technology in 1981, and Ph.D. degree from University of Calgary, Canada in 1986. His research interests include smart grid, power system control, and stability analysis of power system.



### Bio of Guest Speaker - Professor Xiaoming Yuan (千人计划专家袁小明教授)

Xiaoming Yuan, IEEE Senior member, Professor at Huazhong University of Science and Technology, China. "Thousand-Talent" Chair Professor & "National Distinguished Expert"; Chief Scientist 973 National Key Basic Research Program on Renewables Integrations; Member of Expert Board 863 National High-Tech R&D Program for Advanced Energy. He received B.Eng. degree from Shangdong University, China in 1986, M.Eng. degree from Zhejiang University, China in 1993, and Ph.D. degree from Federal University of Santa Catarina, Brazil in 1998.

He was with Qilu Petrochemical Corporation from 1986 to 1990, where he was involved in the commissioning and testing of relaying and automation devices in power systems, adjustable speed drives, and high-power UPS systems. From 1998 to 2001, he was a Project Engineer at the Swiss Federal Institute of Technology Zurich, Switzerland, where he worked on flexible-ac-transmission-systems and power quality. From 2001, he

was with GE Cooperate R&D and was Manager of the Low Power Electronics Laboratory based in Shanghai. In 2009, he was promoted to be the chief Engineer of GE Global R&D Center. In 2010, he joined Huazhong

University of Science & Technology. Prof. Yuan published over 35 papers including 10 in IEEE Transaction and the one winning the first prize paper award from the Industrial Power Converter Committee of the IEEE Industry Applications Society in 1999. He also owned 25 US Patents, and several of them have been widely used in GE products. He researches on renewable power generation, Smart Grid and high power electronic conversion.

## University of Birmingham in Guangzhou to develop next steps for strategic partnership

Senior representatives from the University of Birmingham are visited Guangzhou to enhance the institution's extensive links with partners in the region.

Pro-Vice-Chancellors Professor Edward Peck and Professor Richard Williams met Mr Ma Zhengyong, Deputy Secretary General of the Guangzhou Municipal Government (GMG), affirming the long-term strategic partnership between the City and the University.

The Guangzhou Biobank Cohort Study in partnership with Guangzhou No. 12 Hospital

The Birmingham-Guangzhou Brain Cognition Centre in partnership with Guangzhou No. 1 Hospital

Stem Cell Research on Liver Diseases in partnership with Guangzhou Institute of Biomedicine and Health (GIBH)

Service Industry Study in partnership with Guangzhou University

Together with meetings with local partners relating to the five existing research projects, the University of Birmingham delegation will meet with representatives from South China University of Technologies (SCUT), Jinan University, Guangdong Department of Science and Technology, and the China Electrical Science Research Institute (CEI).

Professor Edward Peck, Pro-Vice-Chancellor, University of Birmingham, said: "This latest visit demonstrates the University's ongoing commitment to advancing our partnerships with Guangzhou and across the Pearl River Delta region. While working on the existing research projects, we are delighted to share further exciting research ideas. These would help Guangzhou to become a centre of research excellence in smart grids, clinical trials and regenerative medicine. In addition, an exchange between student Formula One-style racing teams from the two cities will begin."

The history of collaboration between China and the University spans over 100 years and last year it opened its most significant engagement in the country to date - the University of Birmingham Guangzhou Centre.

Following the opening ceremony, Professor Frank Zhao (Zhao Fuquan), the Vice President of Geely Holdings China presented the inaugural China Institute guest lecture on 'The China Automotive Industry – Today and Tomorrow'. The lecture will give an insight into the rapidly growing Chinese automotive sector and the opportunities and challenges it faces.

The China Institute will provide an umbrella structure for the numerous China interests on the Edgbaston campus. ### **Professor Frank Zhao: The China Automotive Industry – Today and Tomorrow**

During the last ten years, the Chinese automotive industry has experienced rapid growth. Domestic market sales are expected to reach 20 million units this year. Almost all the key players worldwide are fighting in this exciting market to gain a large piece of the pie. Where will this market go in the future? Will it continue to grow as in the past? How can the Chinese local brands compete with those foreign giants? Will Chinese-built vehicles be exported to developed markets as is the case for developing countries? How do Chinese consumer preferences compare with those of Western customers? How can the Chinese automotive industry cope with the increasing pressure of energy shortages? What is the status of technological development in car electrification? What are the key technologies that attract most of the Chinese customers? How do suppliers do business in China? This lecture will address many of the issues that the western automotive industry is curious to learn about from a Chinese auto executive perspective!

Professor Zhao Fuquan joined the Geely Group on 17 November 2006 as an Executive Director. Dr. Zhao is also a Vice President of Geely Holding, Head of Zhejiang Geely Technology Centre, President of Zhejiang Geely Automobile Research Institute Limited and President of Zhejiang Automotive Engineering Institute. Dr. Zhao was granted a Doctorate in Engineering Science from Hiroshima University in Japan and had years of on-the-job working experience in Japan, the United Kingdom and the United States of America. Prior to joining Geely Holding, Dr. Zhao was the research executive of technical affairs of Daimler Chrysler and Vice President of Shenyang Brilliance JinBei Automobile Company Limited and General Manager of its Research and Development Centre. Dr. Zhao, one of the main authors in international automobile magazines, has written 5 English books and has published more than 100 academic dissertation papers on automobile technology. Dr. Zhao has been awarded many patents in his career and has won many prizes and awards. Dr. Zhao was accredited as a Fellow by the Society of Automotive Engineers (SAE) in April 2006. Dr. Zhao is currently a part-time professor in Tsinghua University, Jilin University, Tongji University and several other leading Chinese universities
