**Damien Deighan (BA History, Sport and Recreation Sciences, 1999) Senior International Headhunter, Eisaa Health Ltd, shares his top tips for filling out application forms:**

Write in short sentences and paragraphs.

Use active verbs when describing skills and experience such as organised, delivered, achieved, developed and designed.

- Make sure the information you put in your application matches the job advert and specification asked for.
- Ask someone else to proofread your application form. Any mistakes will lead to your application being rejected.
- Phone the company and make sure they have received your form once you have applied.

**Matthew Cameron (BA Medieval and Modern History, 2009) Head of Permanent Recruitment, Empiric Solutions** "The single most important piece of advice for interviews is to research. This covers more than one area and translates into:



**Research the company** - know who they are, what they do, why they are successful, what you can add to their business and why this company is the best company for you.

**Research the role** - know the role inside out, find videos, forums, articles; anything that will help you gain a better understanding of the role and what will be expected of you. This knowledge will set you apart from other candidates and allow you to provide better examples.

- **Research the interview questions** - anticipate the questions you are likely to be asked and practise your answers with a friend, family member or in front of the mirror.
- Remember to stay calm, positive and always be professional.

Think creatively about networking to build your contacts.

**Jade Bressington (BA Geography, 2003) Deputy Head of Alumni Relations, University of Birmingham** "You have a lot to learn but also a lot to offer - make the most of having a 'fresh pair of eyes', enthusiasm and latent potential. Be patient with yourself and others, listen actively and intently, seek appropriate opportunities and capitalise on them when they arise."

- Using opportunities to be on project teams
- Volunteering to work in focus groups


