

Exploring European competitiveness at inaugural University of Birmingham Brussels symposium

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EU Commissioner for Industry and Entrepreneurship Mr. Antonio Tajani will be the keynote speaker at a University of Birmingham symposium on European Competitiveness next week.

Taking place on Wednesday 1 June 2011 at the University of Birmingham's Brussels office, the symposium explores the alignment of European industrial and innovation policies, putting forward three critical building blocks to achieve this: understanding wealth creation through production; distributed innovation; and the role of public procurement in securing innovation through smart specialisation.

Mr. Tajani will give his analysis on the critical drivers of European competitiveness, protecting and enhancing what is distinctive in Europe in relation to the delivery of Europe 2020, the Innovation Union, and the new EU Industrial Strategy.

Professor Adam Tickell, Pro-Vice-Chancellor, Research and Knowledge Transfer at the University of Birmingham, said: "The University's first Brussels symposium on European competitiveness represents our commitment to this evolving agenda. This is a key moment to focus on the measures likely to foster growth and employment, and maintain the EU's strong industrial economy, while also supporting the development of a competitive services-based society over the next ten years."

Other speakers include Malcolm Harbour MEP, Chair of the European Parliament Committee on the Internal Market and Consumer Protection and Chair of the European Manufacturing Forum, Professor John Bryson, Professor of Enterprise and Economic Geography at the University of Birmingham and Professor Anders Flodström, Member of the Executive Committee of the European Institute for Innovation and Technology (EIT) Governing Board, who will speak about the development of a new EIT Strategic Innovation Agenda and its role in enhancing innovation throughout European industry. Following the speeches there will be an open debate for participants to exchange views with an early evening reception concluding the programme.
