The International Development Department is pleased to announce an exciting opportunity to undertake the **MSc in Governance and State-building** (<http://www.birmingham.ac.uk/students/courses/postgraduate/taught/govsoc/international-development-governance-state-building.aspx>), followed by a six-month internship at IDD and six months with the Mo Ibrahim Foundation in London with a full scholarship. Applicants must have the equivalent of a first class UK bachelors degree and be African nationals domiciled (or permanent residents) in an African country. This programme explores the issues of governance, state-building and development from an interdisciplinary standpoint, combining the theoretical rigour of political science and the practical experience of development. The good governance agenda that has emerged occurs now increasingly alongside the current debate on state-building, which encompasses issues such as accountability and transparency, corruption, conflict, political settlement, human rights, participation, access to justice, and democratisation.

Governance and state-building are of particular interest to governments, non-governmental organisations and development agencies, as well as to a growing and vibrant academic community.

The programme

The Governance and Statebuilding programme is one of the specialised streams within international development, and takes an interdisciplinary standpoint, combining the theoretical rigour of political economy and the practical experience of development. The good governance agenda occurs now increasingly alongside debate on state-building, which encompasses issues such as accountability and transparency, corruption, conflict, political settlement, human rights, participation, access to justice and democratisation. Governance and state-building are of particular interest to governments, non-governmental organisations and development agencies, as well as to a growing and vibrant academic community.

The pathway for the Foundation scholarship comprises the following modules:

- **Critical Approaches to Development** (</postgraduate/courses/taught/govsoc/modules/critical-approaches-development.aspx>) (20 credits)

- **Governance and State Building in Developing Countries** (</postgraduate/courses/taught/govsoc/modules/governance-state-building-developing-countries.aspx>) (20 credits)
- Social Research Methods II (20 credits)
- One of the following four modules (20 credits):
 - **Development Politics** (</postgraduate/courses/taught/govsoc/modules/development-politics.aspx>)
 - **Development Management** (</postgraduate/courses/taught/govsoc/modules/development-management.aspx>)
 - **Conflict in Developing Countries** (</postgraduate/courses/taught/govsoc/modules/conflict-developing-countries.aspx>)
 - **Post Conflict Reconstruction and Development** (</postgraduate/courses/taught/govsoc/modules/post-conflict-reconstruction-development.aspx>)
- **Choice of optional modules** (</postgraduate/courses/taught/govsoc/modules/index-idd.aspx>) (40 credits) – choose from over 25 IDD modules plus others from across the University
- **Dissertation** (</postgraduate/courses/taught/govsoc/modules/dissertation-idd.aspx>) (60 credits) – in depth focus on a topic of particular interest, with support from a supervisor. This may involve overseas fieldwork in a country chosen by the candidate.

Application process

Applications must be received through the University online application system, accessed via www.birmingham.ac.uk (<http://www.birmingham.ac.uk/>) by the 18th May 2015.

In addition to the normal University requirements for supporting documents, candidates must also upload a 500 word statement and CV. This statement should set out why the applicant is the best candidate for the scholarship.

The scholarship

The scholarship includes:

1. Full tuition fee
2. Air fare to and from the United Kingdom and visa
3. Monthly stipend of £920 for 18 months
4. Arrival allowance of £920

The remaining six months for the internship will be funded directly to the successful candidate by the Mo Ibrahim Foundation.

Entry requirements

Eligibility

The entry requirements consist of:

- 1st Class Honours degree or equivalent from an approved university.
- Adequate capacity in written and spoken English. For those whose first language is not English, evidence of this capacity is required. Applicants should reach at least level 6.5 in the IELTS. Please check the University website for more information on English language requirements.
- Experience in economics and statistics, demonstrated through a good mark received for at least one course at undergraduate level.
- Applicants must be African nationals domiciled (or permanent residents) in an African country. Preference will be given to scholarship candidates living in Sub-Saharan Africa.

Learning and teaching

Learning, teaching and assessment

The programme uses a range of learning and teaching methods including short lectures, group work, group and individual presentations, individual study and exercises. Each module is assessed differently using assessments that include 2,000–3,000 word essays, group projects, presentations, exercises and exams. A 10,000–12,000 word dissertation is also required for the MSc award.

By the end of your study you will gain:

- An in-depth understanding of competing development theories – their origins, their continuities and their differences – and the ability to critically evaluate their strengths and weaknesses
- Understanding of the emergence of the good governance agenda in the past decade and a half and its place within the current debate on state-building
- In depth appreciation of aspects of good governance, specifically dealing with political development, accountability and transparency, corruption, human rights, participation, and access to justice
- An ability to analyse these issues in the context of different types of states, including both 'resilient' and 'failed' states, and different levels of civic engagement
- Knowledge of the theory of the emergence of 'governance states', states that are evolving to suit the good governance agenda, supported by donors, rather than evolving to suit the needs of citizens themselves
- Writing skills to produce well structured and coherent essays and reports, making good use of references
- Oral presentation skills
- Ability to access material from different sources including policy documents and other publications from governments and international organisations, documents from the internet, and from books and academic journals
- The capacity to interpret and make use of material from the above sources

Fieldwork

Gain first-hand experience of development concepts plus **valuable work experience without additional costs**. This Masters degree enable students either to carry out **individual fieldwork** (</schools/government-society/departments/international-development/courses/fieldwork.aspx>) in a country and on a topic of their choice or to take part in an organised study visit. Funding for this overseas study is included in the programme fee.

Muirhead Tower comprises 12,000sq.m of floor space between two towers. The tower includes a number of sustainable features including solar shading (known in the trade as brise soleil) to control temperatures, as well as low energy fans; timed lighting to reduce energy waste; natural ventilation systems and a heat source taken from the University's combined heat and power generator.

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The space has been designed to create modern, **attractive spaces for teaching and research** accommodating 150 academic offices, 230 "hubs" for post graduate research students, teaching rooms for up to 100 people and a 200 seat lecture theatre.
