

Made in Britain: Making and Selling Household Goods in Britain 1851-1914

'Made in Britain: Making and Selling Household Goods in Britain, 1851-1914', was a research project led by Dr Francesca Carnevali, University of Birmingham and Dr Lucy Newton, University of Reading. It aims to stimulate research, support an exhibition and work with heritage organisations to increase our knowledge of the design, manufacturing and marketing of household goods in the late nineteenth and early twentieth century.

On 2 March 2012, a workshop which included academics, heritage professionals and graduate students was held in Special Collections at the University of Birmingham. It enabled participants to learn about 'Made in Britain', see presentations describing collections from museums and archives and contribute to the future shape of the project. The workshop was supported by a generous contribution from the Economic History Society. The next stage involves the preparation of a bid for financial support to the Economic and Social Research Council with a view to beginning the project in January 2013.
