I am a social and urban geographer who specialises in identity, belonging, security and the governance of communities. My ESRC-funded doctoral research investigated the political-identity and governance of Muslim communities in Birmingham, in light of the Government's emerging set of counter-terrorism and anti-extremism policies.

Biography

I am an urban and social geographer with a primary research focus on concepts of identity, security and governance of communities in the UK. Since completing my PhD at the end of 2012 I have worked in the University of Liverpool and now the University of Birmingham, teaching core geography undergraduate modules and Masters-level courses on Urban Planning Theory. I have since published two articles, with another in review. I also have extensive experience of research consultancy through working on a number of policy-focussed projects at the Institute of Applied Social Studies at the University of Birmingham.

My doctoral thesis focussed upon the governance and potential securitisation of young Muslim men in the city of Birmingham. It found a striking disconnect between the ways in which identities were experienced and performed by young Muslim men on the ground, and the institutional discourses that surround them. My research used concepts of 'belonging' and the 'politics of belonging' and in particular work by Marco Antonsich, Peter Hopkins and Nira Yuval Davis to explore the complex construction of 'Asian space' and Muslim 'space' in Birmingham: spaces towards which young Muslim participants communicated a strong sense of place-attachment. Simultaneously however, within institutional discourses of terrorism and 'radicalisation', these young Muslim men are considered as being vulnerable themselves and risky to society.

I principally teach core Geography theory and methods to second year undergraduates and Urban Planning Theory and Sustainability to MSc students in Urban Planning.
