Keynote Speaker – Diane Abbott MP

We are lucky enough to have Diane Abbott, MP, Shadow Minister for Public Health and generally popular political personality as our keynote speaker. Diane has been an MP since 1987, in which time she has developed a reputation for standing up for civil liberties, speaking out on issues such as tuition fees and the Iraq war. She has been a frequent guest on the BBC's *This Week*, and has appeared on other prominent TV shows. Diane has also founded the *London Schools and the Black Child* initiative, which aims to raise the educational achievement of black children in London. Aside from politics, Diane has also impressively performed Chopin's Prelude No. 4 in E minor to an audience of piano enthusiasts. Keynote Speaker – Dr Peter Kerr

Dr Peter Kerr, who I'm sure we're all familiar with, has kindly agreed to give a short speech and to give out the prizes (see below.) Peter is the author of *Postwar British Politics: From Conflict to Consensus* and has written numerous journal articles on British Politics.

Keynote Speaker – Professor James Curran

James Curran is Director of the Goldsmiths Leverhulme Media Research Centre, supported by a £1.25 million grant from the Leverhulme Trust. He has held a personal Chair at Goldsmiths since 1989.
