Health Services research

Research Activity

Alistair's research interests are focussed on health care management and policy, particularly in relation to nursing. In recent years this has centred on the organisation of end of life care in a range of settings including care homes, the community and NHS acute trusts.

In addition he is working with colleagues in the Health Services Management Centre on a programme of work to explore how best to organise services to ensure the delivery of compassionate care.

Recent projects include a large scale investigation of service redesign in three acute NHS trusts; An examination of the factors precipitating emergency hospital admissions of people with cancer; An evaluation of frameworks for supporting ward staff in NHS Trusts; and an exploration of how best to promote a culture of research in the NHS.
