About

I teach German, both modern and medieval, at all levels, as well as giving students a rare opportunity to discover and enjoy the oldest of all the Germanic languages, Gothic.

Biography

I graduated from Cambridge University in Modern and Medieval Languages in 1987 and, after a period of postgraduate study, I worked as a schoolteacher of German and French for two years before returning to Cambridge as an Associate Lecturer in German in 1992. I joined the German Department at Birmingham in September 1993.

Teaching

German language at all levels. The History of the German Language; Old High German Language and Literature; Comparative Germanic Philology.

Postgraduate supervision

I have supervised postgraduate students in the areas of the Gothic Language, the Old High German *Hildebrandslied* and the Old High German *Ludwigslied*.

Research

Interests include: the historical linguistics of German and of the Germanic languages in general; aspects of comparative Indo-European philology; the literature of the Old High German period (c. 750-1100 AD). Has published on the relationship between the Germanic and Celtic languages in pre-literary times and the Old High German *Hildebrandslied*.

I am currently the Senior Admissions Tutor for the School of Languages, Cultures, Art History and Music, as well as being the Admissions Tutor for all of Birmingham's combined Modern Languages degrees.
