About

I am a Senior Academic Tutor and Admissions Tutor for the ClinPsyD Programme. I supervise research within the area of health psychology, focusing mainly on coeliac disease, cancer and end of life care. I organise the ClinPsyD health psychology teaching module and support the organisation of the MRes Clinical programme.

Biography

I qualified as a Clinical Psychologist in 1996 from the University of Birmingham and specialised in cancer and palliative care in both a clinical and academic capacity. In 2000 I took up a part-time post on the ClinPsyD Course at Birmingham as a Clinical Tutor and progressed to the role of Clinical Director in 2005, which I held until 2011. In this role I was responsible for the clinical aspects of the training course, including organising and evaluating clinical placements and running supervisor training events. During my time as Clinical Director, I began to further develop my research interests, particular into the psychosocial aspects of Coeliac Disease, and in May 2011 I moved to the post of Senior Academic Tutor in order to concentrate on research, and curriculum organisation and development.

In 2008 I was awarded a grant by Coeliac UK to carry out a 2-year study into the psychological and social implications of Coeliac Disease across the lifespan – the first study of its kind in the UK. On the strength of this research I was awarded an ESRC Knowledge Transfer grant to produce psychoeducational material for young people with Coeliac Disease. We have produced a film entitled "**Gut Feelings: Young people and their experience of coeliac disease**" which is **available for sale on Amazon** (<http://tinyurl.com/m4qbj26>). All proceeds from the sale of the film go directly towards supporting further coeliac disease research.

We have also formed a working partnership with Warburton's, working closely with the team at Newburn Bakehouse, the dedicated gluten-free bakery. With their support we have produced a second psycho-educational film; this one aims to support parents with a child with coeliac disease. This will be launched in December 2014.

I chair the Coeliac Disease Research Steering Group at the University of Birmingham and we have a number of allied projects on-going in addition to our grant-funded research. We have recently set up collaborations with the Open University, Birmingham Children's Hospital, and the National Hospital for Sick Children in Edinburgh with the intention of furthering our work in this under-researched area.

I am a member of the Coeliac UK Health Advisory Council.

In addition to my work at the University of Birmingham I work clinically in the field of palliative care, providing clinical supervision to Clinical Nurse Specialists within both NHS and third sector organisations.

Teaching

I teach various sessions within the ClinPsyD and MRes programmes, including:

- Communication Skills Training
- Models of Applied Psychology
- Reflective Practice
- Psychosocial aspects of Coeliac Disease

Postgraduate supervision

I am involved in the supervision of a number of ClinPsyD, PhD and MRes projects in the areas of coeliac disease, cancer, palliative care, and other long-term health conditions. Currently we are developing research in the area of disordered eating and coeliac disease, and being diagnosed with the condition in older age. Palliative care projects include furthering our understanding of support for male carers, and the role of compassion within palliative care.
