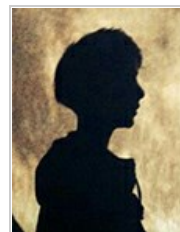
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About

I joined Birmingham in September 2013 and teach modern and contemporary literature and culture. My research interests are in contemporary literature, film, art in relation to digital culture, and new media.

Biography

My undergraduate and MA were both undertaken at Leeds, where I studied in the School of English and the School of Fine Art, History of Art, and Cultural Studies. I completed my PhD at Birkbeck in 2012, with the thesis "Mixed Media: Representations of the digital in American culture".

Teaching

In 2014-15 I am teaching undergraduate courses on Imaging the Digital, Literature in Britain since 1945, Postmodern Fiction, and an MA option on writing and the Internet. I will also be lecturing on courses across the department and supervising BA and MA dissertations.

Research

My research specialism is in representations of the digital in contemporary American literature and culture. I am currently working toward my first book which explores the idea of a 'seam-ful' contemporary culture, looking at texts that push against the image of the digital as immaterial and seamless, and instead suggest the current era is one of complex ties and resistant material manifestations of technology.

I am also working on a project that considers the way digital metaphors often suggest that digital technology enables us to occupy two places at once; I am thinking about how windows, frames, holograms and interfaces permeate images of the digital in recent literature and art.

Authors and artists whose work I am interested in include: Cory Arcangel, Don DeLillo, EL Doctorow, Jennifer Egan, David Fincher, Jonathan Lethem, Eva and Franco Mattes, Takeshi Murata, Richard Powers, Thomas Pynchon, and Gary Shteyngart.

In addition to my own research I am working collaboratively with colleagues at Goldsmiths, University of London, and Concordia University, Montreal, on an evolving investigation into digital culture, taking specific topics as provocations for presentations and articles. Themes we have worked on so far include digital figures, the future anterior in digital culture, and digital exaptation. We have presented at ASAP4 (2012) at the Royal College of Art, The International Conference on Narrative (2013) at Manchester Metropolitan University, and will be presenting as part of the New Media Caucus at the College Art Association annual convention (2014), Chicago. We have published a special issue of the open access journal Alluvium on 'digital metaphors'; and have an article for Media-N journal forthcoming (summer 2014).

Other activities

I co-convene the Contemporary Fiction Research Seminar at Institute of English Studies with Dr Tony Venezia at Birkbeck, University of London. The series invites guest speakers and panels to talk across a range of fields. Previous sessions included work on: Joss Whedon, Caryl Phillips, Pixar, Modernist Legacies, The Dark Knight, Games Culture.
