About

Dr James Treadwell researches and teaches in the areas of Criminology and Criminal Justice His particular expertise is on topics of professional and organised crime, violent crime and victimisation. He is the author of the best-selling textbook *Criminology* (2006) and the revised and updated *Criminology*: *The Essentials* (2012). He is perhaps best known as an ethnographic and qualitative researcher, and has published articles in a number of leading national and international ISI ranked criminology and criminal justice journals. He was the first criminologist to undertake empirical research with former military personnel in UK prisons.

Biography

Dr James Treadwell joined Birmingham Law School as a Lecturer in January 2013, having previously worked at the Department of Criminology at the University of Leicester (2008-2012) and, prior to that the centre for Criminal Justice Policy and Research at Birmingham City University (2003-2008). Prior to becoming an academic, he worked for the crime reduction charity NACRO, and qualified as a Probation Officer in the West Midlands, working in both adult and youth settings. He was academic advisor on the Howard League Commission into Ex-Military Personnel in Prison (advising the inquiry chair Sir John Nutting QC).

Postgraduate supervision

James is happy to supervise doctoral students in criminology and criminal justice, but is particularly keen on innovative and original projects that use some aspect of qualitative (and especially ethnographic) research method. He is always keen to hear from prospective PhD students who are interested in a course of study that involves issues or themes of crime and/or deviance. While his subject specialism tends to centre on crime in relation to social transformation and change and often involves the themes of masculinity, violence, entrepreneurialism and organised crime, Potential research students are always welcome to contact him to discuss their research.

Research

Dr Treadwell's previous work is largely ethnographic, and has involved a range of projects from studying Probation cultures, to a variety of studies of what might be termed more everyday forms of organised crime. He has recently been involved (with Jon Garland at the University of Surrey) in a long term ethnographic study of the English Defence League, while his current research interests revolve around looking at the August 2011 English Riots and wider outbreaks of public disorder in Europe and beyond with Professors Simon Winlow and Steve Hall (University of Teeside) and Dr Daniel Briggs (University of East London). He is also currently working on several journal articles and invited book chapters based on previous research.

Other activities

Dr Treadwell is a member of the Advisory Board for 'No Offence' and serves as Editorial Advisory board member on The Howard Journal of Criminal Justice and the Journal of Criminal Psychology. He has also recently given oral evidence to the Justice Select Committee in its first evidence session in the inquiry into draft sentencing guidelines on Burglary and Drug offences. He was recently invited as a keynote speaker at the OHRN conference, 'Modernising primary healthcare in the criminal justice system: Identifying need; improving access' in Manchester in June 2012 and as a keynote speaker at the recent No Offence Veterans in custody conference at HMP Doncaster. He is also an external examiner for Criminology programmes at Teesside University.
