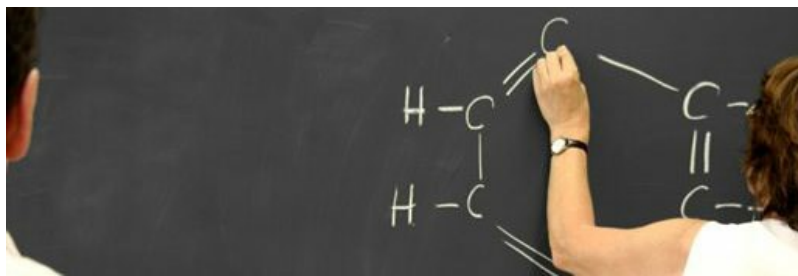


Funding for Initial Teacher Education (ITE) students



The details below provide information on the financial support that is available for ITE course at the University of Birmingham in the 2014/15 academic year.

Tuition fee loans

All UK and EU students (except those on SKE short courses) are eligible to take out a Tuition Fee Loan from the Student Loans Company (SLC) to cover their tuition fee of £9,000 for the academic year 2014/15. This will need to be repaid after graduation, but only once you are in work and earning over £21,000 per year.

UK students should apply to their appropriate **regional funding agency** (<http://www.slc.co.uk/students.aspx>) for the Tuition Fee Loan at the same time as applying for other statutory support.

Maintenance loans and grants

UK students only (except those on SKE courses) are eligible to apply for a Maintenance Loan, if required, of up to £5,555 (if living away from home and outside of London) to cover general living costs.

UK students may also be eligible for a means-tested Maintenance Grant of up to £3,387. Applications are assessed by your appropriate **regional funding agency** (<http://www.slc.co.uk/students.aspx>) and supplementary grants (e.g. Parents Learning Allowance, Childcare Grant, Disabled Students' Allowances, etc) may also be available to you.

Training bursaries

UK and EU ITE students may be eligible for a training bursary of up to £20,000 from the National College for Teaching and Leadership or up to £25,000 as a scholarship from various NCTL-related organisations. Students on a SKE course may be eligible for a bursary of up to £7,200. Full details will be sent to you in the Summer, immediately prior to the start of your course.

If you are eligible, the University will pay the bursary to you on a monthly basis during your course. It will not be subject to income tax.

Please note that for 2014/15, PE will no longer be an eligible subject for a bursary.

Hockerill Educational Foundation grants

The Hockerill Educational Foundation invites applications for grants (usually worth £500 - £1000 per year) to teacher training students who have particular financial difficulties.

Students training to teach Religious Education are their highest priority, but they can also help students in other areas, particularly primary education students. If you think you may be eligible, you should apply now for a grant for the academic year 2014-15. Applications received by 31 March 2014 have priority, but they will consider applications received during April/May if funds are available. The final deadline is 31 May 2014.

Association of Church College Trusts

Trainees in secondary Religious Education are eligible to apply to one of the Church College Trusts for a grant towards course expenses or living expenses. International students

International students are not eligible for Tuition Fee Loans, Maintenance Loans/Grants or training bursaries. In exceptional circumstances, they may be eligible for a Hockerill Educational Foundation grant.
