'Mature student' is a national term. You are considered a mature student if you are over 21 when you start an undergraduate programme or over 25 when you start a postgraduate programme.

This page is designed for any student who feels their experiences will be different from a standard 18 year old student (e.g. a younger student who is also a parent or has other responsibilities).
