Greetings

Like most academics I am somewhat hypocritical when it comes to league tables. In the past I have prattled on at length about why league table x is not relevant to what we do because it does not take into account the unique experience of we offer nor can one league table be a fair comparison between universities of different sizes. However, in the last newsletter I note that the first bullet point I offered as a measure of the School's success was its rapid rise in the Guardian league table (from 19th to 6th in case you have forgotten!). I also find it interesting that the first thing I thought about including in this introduction was the fact that The Times and The Sunday Times have awarded Birmingham the title of 'University of the Year' for 2013-14 and not surprisingly I would argue that Civil Engineering has played a large part in achieving this prestigious accolade. So, I am forced to come to the conclusion that one of the reasons I did not like league tables in the past is that they made uncomfortable reading. It is difficult to pinpoint the key ingredient that led to our transformation and I am only too aware that circumstances can change very quickly. However, what I do know helps is the support we have received from our alumni over the recent years. This year the School has decided to start fundraising in order to develop a sponsorship fund for our postgraduate students. Over the last couple of years we have not only witnessed the demand for postgraduate education increase but at the same time heard a large number of distressing stories from prospective students relating to financial hardship. In many cases a small scholarship of £3,000 would be transformative and turn the dream of obtaining an MSc into reality. Hence, we are looking to raise £300,000 to secure at least ten scholarships per year for the next tenyears. Returning to awards and allocates, we have also worked hard to obtain an award which I suspect that many of you will (a) not have heard of and (b) may not be that impressed once you have heard what it is called, however, it has important ramifications for the future and will help to ensure that School remains on track and looks after its staff; In September, the School was awarded the Bronze award by Athena Swan (see logo below). The Athena SWAN Charter promotes and rewards good practice in the recruitment, retention and progression of women in Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics and Medicine (STEMM) subjects. Since the School had not previously embraced the principles embodied in the Athena SWAN charter, the Bronze award was the highest award that could have been achieved. The School intends to use this award to ensure a better work life balance for all of its staff and students and is a small but important step in the right
