

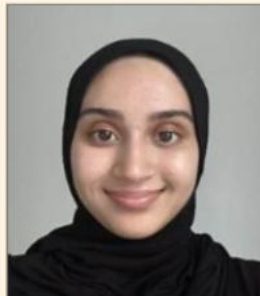


CHILD INFORMATION SHEET

We are Cathy Manning, Sam Tyler, Aneesa Begum and Lily Herbert. We are researchers from the University of Birmingham.

We are inviting you to take part in our project. The project looks at how comfortable or uncomfortable young people find different images to look at. This can help us make the world more comfortable for children in the future.

What will I be asked to do if I take part?

We will invite you to:

1. Play an online computer game.

You will see lots of images. You will be asked to say if each one is comfortable or uncomfortable.



2. Do some puzzles. Your parent will answer some questions.

* You should wear your glasses if you need them.

Everything will take you around 20 minutes.

We are doing these activities to find out more about how young people see things. It is not a test. We just want to know what you think.

Where and when will the project take place?

Online on a computer or tablet. This can be at home, at school, or somewhere else (e.g., a science fair).

What will I get if I take part?

- You and your parent will have the chance to win a £25 voucher.
- You will be helping future children, by telling us what visual information is comfortable or uncomfortable. This will mean we can design better schools, public spaces, and materials.

Do I have to take part?

No. It's OK if you don't want to take part. You don't have to say why you don't want to take part. If you ever want to

take a break, or stop doing the project, just tell your parent or the researcher. We hope that the research will help us make the world more comfortable for you and other children.

What will happen to the results of the project?

We will keep your personal information (like your name) private. Only members of the project team will see it. Some information we collect from you will be kept and shared with other researchers, but we will not let anyone else see your personal information. Nobody will be able to tell that the data came from you.

What should I do next?

Ask your parent or the researcher if you have any questions. If you want to take part, your parent will be asked to fill in a form giving their permission. You will also be asked to fill in a form.

What if there is a problem?

If something goes wrong or you are worried about something, please talk to your parent about it, or a researcher in the pictures.
