About the Birmingham Masters Scholarship Scheme

For 2018 entry, the University has 100 new £2,000 scholarships available for Masters students in selected subject areas. The awards will be allocated on the basis of merit – simply meeting the criteria (including subject specific criteria) will not guarantee that an application is successful.

Eligibility criteria:

The Birmingham Master Scholarships will be available to students who are:

Domiciled in the UK or EU

Students recorded as Home or EU for fee-status purposes are eligible, provided that they meet the other eligibility criteria.

· Studying full time or part time

Self-funded

You must be self-funding or applying for a postgraduate government loan to pay your fees and living expenses.

• Not already registered on a postgraduate programme

Applicants must not currently be enrolled on a postgraduate degree course.

• Undertaking a Masters course in an eligible subject

£2,000 Subject Scholarships are available for priority subject areas (see below) only.

Judging criteria:

Eligibility to receive the scholarship will be determined by a University selection panel based on the following criteria:

• Academic excellence

Birmingham Masters Scholarships are primarily awarded on the basis of academic performance in the applicants' previous studies. Candidates are expected to attain or have attained a First-class or Upper Second-class (2:1) Honours degree (or the equivalent) for their undergraduate qualification. Successful applicants will be students with outstanding academic potential. Other indicators of high academic achievement may include:

- Weighted grade average / module marks on student transcripts;
- university prizes or awards;
- overall ranking position within in cohort;

Professional qualifications and achievements

Qualifications and other notable achievements from relevant professional roles will be taken into account.

• Student motivation / strength of the personal statement

The personal statement is a chance to make the application stand out. It should, amongst other things: outline the student's interest in the subject, demonstrate that their background has sufficiently prepared them for the degree, mention any relevant experience and outline how the course will fit into their future plans.

• College/University subject priorities

Selection Panel

Nominees will be selected by a cross-college panel at the University. The membership of the panel will include:

Application process

Round 1 deadline: 23:59 BST, 31 January 2018

To be considered for an award, applicants must, by the 31 January deadline, have:

Made an application to their intended Masters programme. Please apply through the
relevant programme page on the Course finder section of the University of Birmingham
website (http://www.birmingham.ac.uk/postgraduate/courses/taught/listing.aspx).
This must include all of the relevant supporting documentation: references, transcripts if
available, and English language certification if applicable.

AND

Completed the Birmingham Masters Scholarship application form

 Applicants should enter the application ID number that they were given during the application to the Masters programme.

Round 2 deadline: 23:59 BST, 5 April 2018

Round 3 deadline: 23:59 BST, 15 June 2018

Selection process

Round 1

Round 1 applications will be assessed in February 2018, and all applicants will be informed by email whether they have been successful or not.

Candidates who are selected for the awards will be asked to accept/decline the award by a given deadline. If a successful candidate fails to respond by the given deadline or declines the offer, their award will be used for Round 2.

Round 2

Round 2 applications will be assessed in April 2018. Candidates who are selected for the awards will be asked to accept/decline the award by a given deadline. If a successful candidate failed to respond by the given deadline or declined the offer, their award will be used for Round 3.

Round 3

Candidates who are selected for the awards will be asked to accept/decline the award by a given deadline. If a successful candidate fails to respond by the given deadline or declines the offer, their award will automatically be transferred to a reserve candidate who is next in line for the award.
